# A Word from the Director

The program year began in June 2016 with plans to build a new website, buy new buses, provide training for teachers on classroom management, and to add more Conscious Discipline techniques to the classrooms. We received additional funding for Duration Expansion to increase the number of hours Head Start and Early Head Start children receive services during the year and the final group of employees received raises through the reduction in cost of Workers' Compensation insurance. The number of accidents over the year continued to decrease and therefore, reduce the rating for RCCDC as a company.

Training for all employees began on August 1 as it does every year and the preparations were ready to hold the annual Preservice training on August 11, 2016. Unfortunately, it had been raining for several days from Baton Rouge to Covington and as the rain grew worse, the rivers overflowed, flooding streets and towns which had never flooded previously. This was the second flooding it the same general area in less than a year and many people whose homes flooded in March 2016 began to flood again. In order to avoid employees traveling in the rain, we canceled the Preservice training.

By August 13, the office and classrooms in the Robert and the Livingston center were flooded and remained flooded for three to four days. In addition, the homes and property of many employees and Head Start families flooded. We spent the remainder of the program year renovating the buildings in Robert and Walker and replacing the items lost in the flood. We were fortunate to have volunteers to help, community donations and committed employees who came to work during the day and repaired their own homes in the evening and on weekends.

The floods of 2016 were devastating for many and provided new opportunities for others, including Regina Coeli but with everyone working together with support from the community, almost everything was back to normal by the end of the program year.

Children who begin school with untreated health concerns are likely to experience difficulty in their academic endeavors. For this reason, the program coordinates health-related services for children such as speech screenings, hearing tests, dental exams, immunizations, and physicals.

RCCDC Centers are participating in the I'm Moving, I'm Learning project which seeks to add physical movement to the child's day at school and improve healthy food choices at school and for life. PHYSICALS

The chart details how many enrolled children received physical and dental exams.

RCCDC provides carefully planned foods to help meet the children's daily nutritional needs serving a healthy breakfast, lunch and snack every day. Children and adults eat together in family style meals served in classrooms. Children are encouraged to make nutritious food choices and try foods new to them.

A monthly menu plan is provided to families to help in planning and sharing ideas for meals. Nutrition counseling is available to parents or guardians to assist with any nutrition concerns.

Access to education, training, and support services is just as important for parents and other family members as it is for children. Over the past year, parents supported the program through involvement at the program level through the Policy Council, School Readiness Committee, the Nutrition Advisory Committee, and the Health Services Advisory Committee. In addition, parents support the individual centers by volunteering for classroom activities, home to school activities, male involvement activities, fundraising activities, and even working in the kitchen or as a custodian. Staff members also meet with families

to address needs including vocational education, counseling, and parenting skills. Some of the activities include:

## MENTAL HEALTH

Mental health and wellness for children is important for success in school and life. RCCDC programs help children feel good about themselves, develop healthy relationships, manage daily stress, and solve problems. Mental health classroom activities provide children with the social and emotional skills they will need throughout the life span. RCCDC staff provides materials and opportunities for each child to explore, experiment, create, question, and make sense of the world around them. Our programs can help both children and families with the necessary skills to help them cope with adverse and stressful events, as well as assist families during times of needs or crisis.



# **Education & Special Needs Services**

The educational program has a developmentally appropriate curriculum designed to improve emergent literacy, numeracy, language, general cognitive and motor skills in a positive learning environment. Children are prepared for kindergarten through classroom activities, field trips to the kindergarten, parent meetings with school representatives, and periodic assessments to determine goals to best prepare the individual child for the next school setting.

CLASS, or the Classroom Assessment Scoring System, is an observational measure that looks at interactions between teachers and students. These ratings are categorized into three areas: Emotional Support, Classroom Organization, and Instructional Support. The CLASS scores results for RCCDC are shown in the table below where the overall score is higher than the National Head Start average.

RCCDC Head Start teachers use the Creative Curriculum, a comprehensive, research-based curriculum which addresses the needs of the whole child. Children are active learners participating in direct, hands-on experiences with people, objects, events, and ideas. Children make choices and follow through on their plans and decisions. Adults expand children's critical thinking skills through the use of diverse materials and supportive teaching strategies. Teachers send home activities for parents to share with the child which also helps to prepare the parents for school.

Head Start and Early Head Start teachers utilize the Teaching Strategies GOLD Assessment to measure ongoing progress of the child throughout the year for all areas of development and learning with performance tasks selected for predictors of school success. Observational data is analyzed at three checkpoints and used to document children's learning, develop appropriate learning activities and goals for each child, and identify at-risk children. Children's progress between checkpoints are compared and shared with parents. Overall classroom results are used to identify strengths of the program and areas needing improvement.

**Disabilities:** Teachers work with children who have identified special needs just as they work with typical children to accommodate the needs of the children in order to provide a successful learning environment. Over 17% of the enrolled children had disabilities with 10% of those being significant disabilities.
