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A Message from the Executive Director

The year 2020-2021 makes me think of Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde because we started off with a bang, lots of excitement, new Early Head Start centers opening, and more children being served We crossed mid-year with energy and when March 2020 arrived, the world changed for everyone.

As you know the virus Covid-19 spread quickly and the response was to close schools and many businesses, people were instructed to work from home where possible. Early Child care licensing limited the number of children allowed in a classroom, and Regina Coeli responded by serving children remotely using telephones, email, Facebook, Facetime and product new to many of us called Zoom.

We served children remotely through the end of the year and returned to our offices in May to complete the program year. This was not a typical year and therefore, this is not a typical annual report. The most important thing is the work we did to serve children and families.

Education & Special Needs Services

Our teachers use a developmentally appropriate curriculum designed to improve emergent literacy, numeracy, language, general cognitive and motor skills in a positive learning environment. Children are prepared for kindergarten through classroom activities, field trips to the kindergarten, parent meetings with school representatives, and periodic assessments to set goals and prepare the individual child for the next school setting.

RCCDC Head Start teachers use Creative Curriculum, a comprehensive, research-based curriculum designed to address the needs of the whole child. Children are active learners participating in direct, handson experiences with people, objects, events, and ideas. Children make choices, plans and decisions in the learning process. Adults expand



children's critical thinking skills through supportive teaching strategies. Teachers send home activities for parent engagement and preparation for school.

Head Start and Early Head Start teachers use the Teaching Strategies Assessment to measure the child's ability in the beginning of the year, and the child's progress on a variety of skills. The results are shared with parents and used to determine appropriate learning activities and goals for each child throughout the year. The child's progress is tracked by comparing the final assessment to the earlier assessments and all are share with the child's parent.



Disabilities: Teachers work with children who have identified special needs just as they work with typical children to accommodate the needs of the child in order to provide a successful learning environment. Over 17% of the enrolled children had disabilities with 10% of those being significant disabilities.

Health Services

In spite of the difficult year Head Start and Early Head Start continued to work with children and parents to screen children for any health concerns and ensure parents were able to obtain the necessary follow up care



Nutrition

Providing food and nutritional meals for children has always been a high point of the Head Start program. The focus on providing healthy food in classrooms operated normally at the beginning of the year and continued throughout the program year until May. Regina Coeli provided food for the family for an entire week.



Mental Health

Mental Health services were especially critical over the 2019-2020 program year. Head Start staff worked with children and families to identify sources of stress and to provide resources or access to counselors, as needed. Teachers provided activities for parents to do with their children and support mental health for the family.

Parent Involvement Activities

Access to education, training, and support services is just as important for parents and other family members as it is for children. Over the past year, parents supported the program through involvement at the program level through the Policy Council, School Readiness Committee, the Nutrition Advisory Committee, and the Health Services Advisory Committee in spite of most of these being held by Zoom.
